Anna Hamilton Smock was born in Greenwood, Pa., March 21, 1871 and died at her home in New Plymouth June 9, 1945 at the age of 74 years. Mrs. Smock had been a resident of New Plymouth since 1906. Survivors include a son Carlyle and a daughter Mrs. Lucille Olson of LaGrande, four grandchildren and two great-grandsons. A son preceded her in death in 1928. She also leaves two sisters to mourn her passing. Mrs. Smock was the last surviving charter member of the Baptist church in New Plymouth.

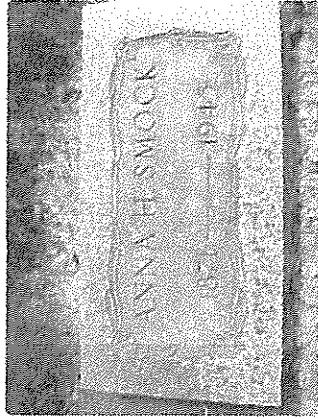

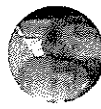

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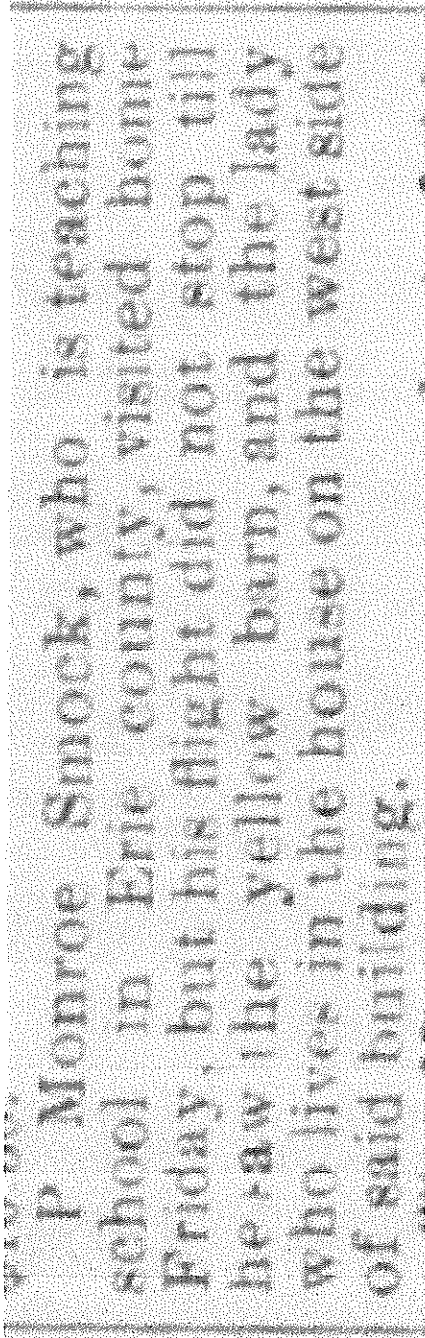

Evansburg, via Colter's mills, turn at
Lake house. The surprise was in
Robert Williams, who started 15 min-
utes before Tiffany and finished three
minutes ahead of the second man. As
he went over the tape he said

WAVERLY PREACHER ACCUSED.

Church Trial Called for Investigation of His Conduct.

Special to Times-Republican.

Waverly, Nov. 6.—Rev. P. Smock, of this place, is to be given a church trial here on charges of conduct unbecoming a Christian and gentleman.

Mr. Smock is not now in active pastoral work. He retired from such duties some time ago on account of his health, and while in retirement dabbled in politics with such success that he was elected county superintendent of Bremer county on the democratic ticket at the election in 1901.

He is reported to have indulged in unwarranted liberties in his relations with women, and the reputation of a Bremer county schoolman suffers equally with that of the ex-minister as the result of the rumors that are afloat.

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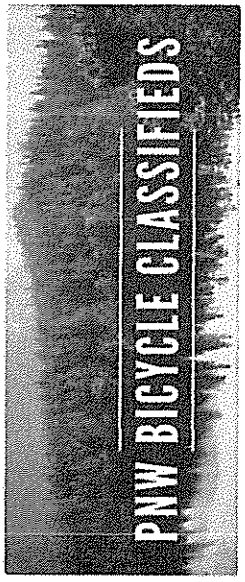
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His action is believed to be without precedent and unheard of in church procedure in Iowa. The judge did not issue the injunction, as that would involve a lawsuit, but sent for the pastor and a committee from the church to lay the matter before them, telling them that the injunction had been served, but he did not desire to precipitate a lawsuit unless it was their desire to go ahead with the council, when such action would then become necessary.

The council had been mutually called some time ago by Rev. Smock and the officary of the church. In response to the call nearly forty men, pastors and laymen representing the thirty-seven churches in the Cedar Valley Association and the missionary organizations, arrived in Waverly and their surprise can better be imagined than described when they learned that an injunction against their consideration of the matter in hand had been asked for. Very few of the pastors or deacons knew anything of the charges that had been preferred against Rev. Smock and they had come to vindicate him if he was found to be innocent.

Another unheard-of proceeding, according to local Baptists, was the asking and granting of letters of with-

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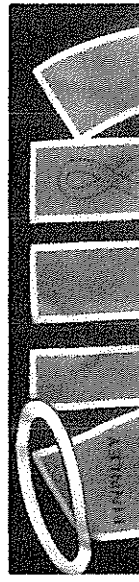
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drawal to Rev. Smock from the Baptist church as pastor and member by a small majority of the members at a meeting held only a few days ago while the charges were pending against the gentleman. This proceeding, so far as is known, is also without precedent, and local Baptists affirm that if such action will bear the scrutiny of the law it opens a way whereby any pastor can engage in unchurchly conduct, ask for letters of dismissal and, if he can muster a majority, be absolved from any responsibility to the church. They say this might open a way for unfettered licentiousness on the part of a pastor or a member so far as responsibility to church government is concerned.

After the persons composing the council had gathered and talked the matter over it was decided to send a committee to see Rev. Smock. The committee found him in his office, and he claimed he was without the pale of the church, being no longer a minister of the denomination or a member of the church, and for these reasons the council had no right to meet in an official capacity to investigate the charges made or pass on his guilt or innocence. The committee could do nothing else than retire.

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If the council would have attempted to have met it would have precipitated a suit at law, and there could not have been elected a moderator or any other officers. The members of the council, the pastors and deacons and representatives of the missionary societies, would have become co-defendants to the action and the matter of making the injunction permanent or dissolving it would have to be argued before the judge who gave it. The Baptist church as a body is composed of individual congregations and there can be no responsibility attaching to the church as a body except that responsibility is assumed by the pastors and individual members. Because of this it was decided by the delegates that they would do nothing to precipitate a suit at law. Mr. Smock has engaged several of the brightest lawyers of Waverly to look after his legal interests, and he is disposed to fight the matter to the end.

The charges were upon immoral grounds, but their exact nature has not been made public. The charges were brought by the pastor, Rev. Graves, and the deacons of the church. The congregation is about equally divided as to Mr. Smock's guilt, those believing him innocent being in the main the feminine portion of the congregation. In large part those whom he baptized or took into the church while he was pastor. His withdrawal from the church was voted by a majority of seven votes.

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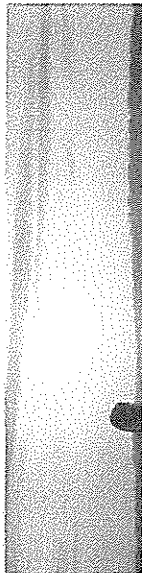

Waverly, Nov. 10.—The story sent from Waverly, relative to the Rev. Smock matter, to several of the dailies throughout the state and in substantially the same form, has been read with interest here. Some of the facts are correctly stated, but on the whole it is inaccurate and apparently partisan.

The inception of the Smock episode lies either in the sudden and deplorable loss of moral character on the part of Mr. Smock, or it is the old story of the combined workings of green-eyed, jealous, political machinations and cowardly revenge.

Mr. Smock was pastor of the Baptist church in this city for three years prior to January, 1902, at which time he became county superintendent, to which office he had been elected by a phenomenal majority, after a campaign in which a bitter newspaper fight had been made against him.

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During the past few months his character, which previously had been above reproach, has been assailed. These rumors were first made public during his absence with his family on a visit in the east. Learning of the rumors upon his return, he promptly denied them in toto. The scandal seemed to have died a natural death, but when on Sunday, Oct. 19, Mr. Smock asked Pastor Graves for credentials to attend the meeting of the state convention as a delegate, Mr. Graves declined to furnish them on the ground that objections had been made against the granting of the same. 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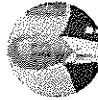

But even Mr. Smock's withdrawal was not to result in harmony; for on the afternoon of the succeeding Thursday, Mr. Smock was handed a notice signed by Pastor Graves to the effect that charges had been filed accusing him of conduct unbecoming a minister and member of the church, and that they would be considered at a meeting held that evening. At this meeting another warm discussion of the matter ensued. After the whole matter had been gone over quite thoroughly a vote was taken. Mr. Smock was again sustained with the result that his resignation was accepted and the charges again discussed.

This meeting was to be convened the succeeding Wednesday. Mr. Smock on the other hand took and maintained the position that this matter having its origin only in scandal and malice, having been twice settled by the church was enough settled, and that the calling and convening of the council would only result in giving greater publicity to these false rumors, and result in spreading a suspicion against him which no act of his had ever warranted. He assumed the position that the council, no matter how favorable its decision might be, could not determine anything, and that if there was to be any further settlement, it must be before a proper tribunal whose decision would stand and in which the rights of all parties would be fairly and impartially protected.

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Acting upon these conclusions, it is understood that Mr. Smock thru his attorneys, did present the matter legally to the court, and that the judge, who, by the way, holds the position of moderator and highest authority of the Baptist church in the state, called in and counselled with the representatives of the opposition to Mr. Smock. The result was that the delegates to the council declined to assume any authority in the matter Mr. Smock being no longer a member of the church, and no council was held. A committee, however, was sent, as stated in the newspaper reports, to Mr. Smock inviting him to appear before the council. This however he declined to do, he having taken the position that he was no longer a member of the church and that whatever conclusion the council might reach would be of no benefit either to him or to the church, the council being only an advisory body of the church, and the church having twice vindicated him. In replying to the committee he stated among other reasons that owing to the undue excitement and passion now existing between certain members of the church, it would be detrimental to all concerned for him to comply with their request.

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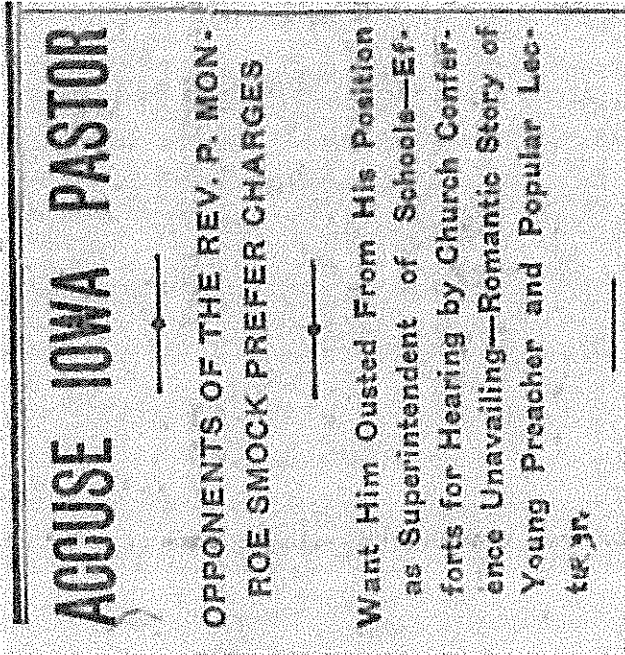

WAVERLY, Iowa, Nov. 22.—With the assembling of the county board of supervisors last Monday came the climax in one of the most sensational and absorbing affairs ever known here. The climax is a request asking for the removal of Rev. P. [redacted] from the office of county superintendent of schools on charges of immorality.

Stirring Service in Memory of Dead, the Nation Severs Baptist Church Crowded to the Doors and Heedfully Decimated.

The auditorium of the Baptist church was by far too small to accommodate the large audience which assembled to hear the patriotic sermon to the members of the G. A. R. and the Woman's Relief corps preached by Rev. P. Monroe Smock, pastor of the church at the regular service yesterday morning. The passageway and doors of the auditorium were packed tight during the whole service by people who listened intently to the magnificent music and the fervent words of the speaker.

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The service opened with a special chorus by the choir, the members of which each wore a tiny silk flag in honor of the veterans. After the opening prayer and an anthem by the choir хор, Smock stepped forward on the pulpit, which was beautifully decorated with flowers and flags, and addressing the audience spoke as follows:

"What mean these stones?"—
Joshua 4-21.

For 40 years Moses had been the undisputed leader of the Jews. He climbed to the summit of Mt. When ascending Jerusalem he said: "What mean these stones?" the story of the walls of water, dry river bed, and miracle—in an exceeding was to be repeated perpetually throughout their generations.

We have our national monuments, two in number, the day we celebrate and the day we decorate. How fitting then, that a redeemed nation should annually pay her tribute of respect to the memory of her individual redeemers, and while many of them are now sleeping beneath the blossoming of flowers, the whispering of leaves, the song of birds, and the dawn of night, by their heroic sacrifice old story waves today with not a stripe effaced and not a star obscured.

Youth was a patriotic motive, when Rome was threatened the oracle said only Rome's most precious gift could save the city. Women cast their wealth and men their money into the channel, but the gulf was not closed. Young Curtius knew the most valuable thing of Rome was her young manhood, and throwing himself into the abyss closed the breach and the city was saved. The same price was paid to close the widening channel which north and south and such of the best manhood of both north and south was thrown into the awful gulf of a civil war. But the nation was saved and this service is in memory of such men as these.

I am not ungrateful of the fact that some say it was for the \$13 per month you went to the front; that the real heroes were the ones that remained at home; and if another way was discovered doubtless they would do a great deal of 'cutting and shooting' but only as they cut across the fields and shot under the beds. Such 'braves' should permit this couplet in their minds and commit it to memory: 'I've lost no limbs as I can see.

I've shed no drops of gore;
But I shot my mouth off constantly,
All through the civil war."

In 1776 our fathers dipped their quills in ink and wrote that all men were created free and equal, but it remained for you in 1862 to dip your sword in blood and prove that statement true. When your cannons fell the whistling bullets were flying thick and fast; today the market exists on the wall because broken. When they fell, the warlike, maring cannon thundered far and wide! Today it informs the plebeian parks of our cities and in its mouth the sparrow barks her nest. When they fell the shriek and sob of the southern slave rent the silence of the midnight air. huc today every slave-chain is broken and over north and south is heard the anthem "America is free!"

A country is made great by her men and women. The best Saxe could say for his native state was that "it raised men." What men we had in the years that shed men's souls! Pennsylvania gave you Dickinson, loved an "Little Black." Ohio furnished Sherman. Illinois responded with Grant; Virginia gave your opponent Robert E. Lee, but it took three states to supply the greatest heroism of them all. Born in Kentucky, nurtured in Indiana, developed in Illinois, coming in himself the statesmanship of Moses and the comradship of a Joshua, he lived, loved, labored and died—but not until his earthly fame faded into the clouds of everlasting glory, and the preserver of Abraham Lincoln into the city whose builder and maker is God, was the thirteenth, fourteenth and fifteenth amendments to the constitution of the United States of America.

Now would I lock the wyes, wild, own wild waters of the boys of '63. They remained at home and called and prayed and watched for the news of battle. Better to me than England's rained queen are these boys in such belongeth my need of fondest praise.

A few months ago I stood on Pennsylvania Avenue, Washington, and thought of the inspiring scene at the close of the civil war. I could see the stream of blue flowing rhythmically through that city between the perpendicular banks of stone-front buildings on either side. I saw the place where the banner was stretched from side to side on which was lettered the motto, "There's nothing too good for the soldier," and holy was the apostolic side might have carried the motto. "Not his wife, widow, or sweet heart." And what was true then, is still true. Would you insist all have the fat of the land—been an elite man a woman's meek touch; breakfast as black as my foot and as big as the emancipation proclamation; biscuits as thick you wouldn't know, if fat, and whether they would rise or fall, and play on big as wagon wheels, cut only

at right angles, four pieces at each
meal, and served five times a day.

But's closing word, I am too young
to belong to the Grand Army of the
Republic, but I hold membership in
the G. A. R.'s. So many every one. My
order does not hold a national en-
campment, but an international en-
campment. The city in which it is
held is not on earth, but a heavenly
city. The commander-in-chief is
called the "Prince of Peace." May you
all so faithfully obey the orders of this
captain of your salvation, that when
one of you are mustered out of
the Grand Army of the Republic you
may one of one be mustered in this
order, which is "God's Army of the
Redeemed."

This committee held a meeting with the board of directors of the Boise Commercial club with the result that the club directors have taken a great interest in the movement. None of the committee, however, knew much about the details of such an assembly and it was determined that the Rev. Mr. Smock should go east, attend assemblies and return with a report on which to base the organization of a Chautauqua here.

The movement to organize an assembly in Boise has created much interest, especially among those who have attended such assemblies. By those who know the benefits to be derived from such meetings nothing is regarded as of more value to the city. An assembly such as the one proposed for Boise would bring at least 30,000 people here every year. Among these would be some of the most prominent speakers in the country, for it is proposed that Boise have the best. It can be judged from the personnel of those who have interested themselves in the movement that it will be a success and that next summer, perhaps at this time, Boise will be entertaining many people attendant upon a Chautauqua.

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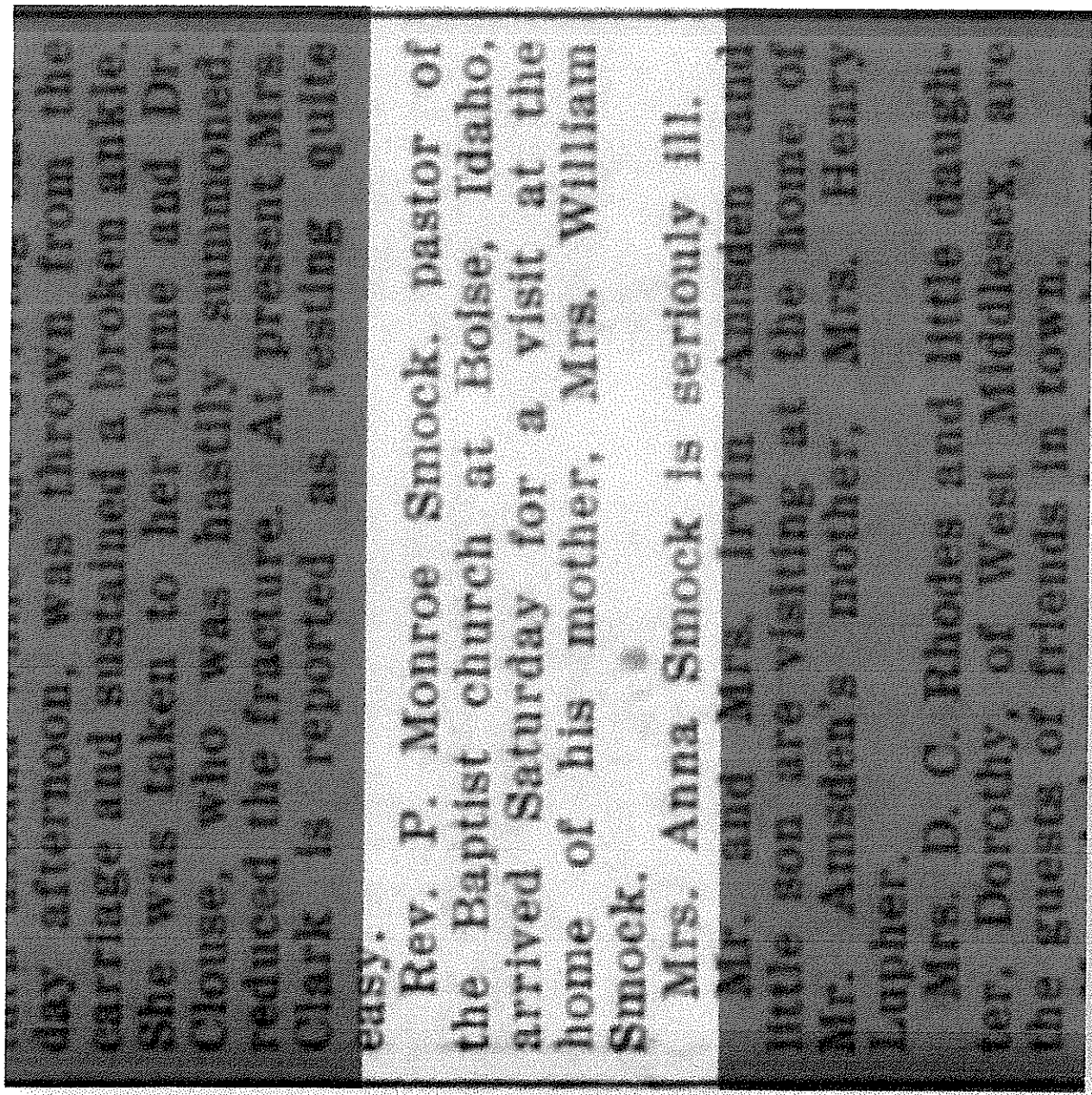

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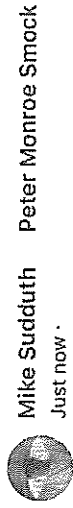

Rev. Mr. Smock spoke of the far-reaching influence of Christ as a teacher ever since he had taught the disciples to pray. All through his discourse he pleaded for an observance of the spirit of the Father in teaching the young pupils of the public schools. He spoke of the importance of teachers and asked that they not consider their duty simply to get money for their work, but to act so as to give their pupils an influence to do good. "Exalt your position," he said.

The speaker dwelt on the importance of the teacher having a personal knowledge of her pupils and patience with them. It depended to some extent upon the teacher, he said, whether children starting to school this morning would grow up as they should. The teacher's greeting and her conduct toward the pupils would be impressed upon the young minds and no matter how the teacher acted the impression would be a lasting one and the children would be influenced accordingly.

The teachers were asked to look for the good and not the bad in their pupils, which they were told would bring better results. "The purpose of teaching is the end, not the means. There is no end to school life."

Last spring he was so ill that it was thought he would be obliged to take an enforced vacation to recuperate, but he rallied and again took up the work. The pastorate work of the Boise church has been very heavy and lack of strength alone has compelled him to take the step which was a sincere regret to his whole parish.

Mr. Smock urged his parish to accept his resignation in the spirit in which it was given and it was done with much reluctance.

During the two years of Rev. 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"The demand for men trained in horticulture is growing sharper with each succeeding year. Never, since horticulture became established as a profession, has the call been so urgent. Yet, the young men of the land are not responding. The chief source of supply in the ranks of our redneck mechanics, school teachers, bricklayers, engineers, publicans and the like; in other words, from the intellectual and business world. These, indeed, are trained men, but they are not horticulturally trained. Many of these men have made great mistakes in completely frittering and some have done the world a great service in their declining years. Not, had their men heard and yielded to the call of nature early in their youth, they might have found infinitely greater success. And would, no doubt, have given the world more that it does not now possess.

"I, therefore, address myself to young men as a young man in behalf of the profession of horticulture.

"The opportunities now open to young men in this field are practically unlimited. The demand for graduates actually is hundreds of times greater than the supply. Over 50 requests for young men thus trained came in to our college last year. But these requests could not be satisfied, I have in my hand a letter from the American Horticultural Exposition which addressed to Professor Shinn that is interesting and will throw some light on the subject.

Mr. Lyman stated that the majority of the undertaking in North Carolina probably hindered young men from taking up the work because that any one of the many lines of the work requires a knowledge of study. 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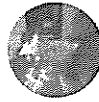

He declared that prunsgrowing has been on the decline during the past ten years but that for both fresh and dried prunes, together with the fact of having being the leading prune state, means much encouragement for the industry in Idaho.

The various fruits were mentioned as offering profitable fields of effort. A most profitable and fascinating field of endeavor, he stated, is hand-scrape gardening. Zughian, he said, lends in this respect, but the people of this country are awakening to its importance. The large cities offer special inducements to qualified men in that art and science.

He explained the growing demand for trained horticulturists as a result of the many business men buying gone to the country to live since the advent of interurban railroads. The business men have undertaken horticulture and are demanding trained men to handle their orchards.

He explained that the profession does not offer slavery bells of ease or fat rich quick propositions to young men, but it is a call for young men with a high and noble purpose, men that will sacrifice men that will die and men that will work for the common good of all. Men for whom the epitaph may be written:

"This man was a man who gave his life for a fruitful cause. He did his work well, and remembered ever God's law."
